## Student Rights Revamped

The Code of Student Conduct for Haskell students has had its policies and procedures for violations updated. Due to the amount of violence on-campus last semester involving students, Haskell has decided to alter the student rights system.

When asked about the update, Dr. Swisher commented "...without removing student's rights, students are still given due process."

The new system has been broken up into three different areas; safety, traffic, and housing. Four people have been assigned to take care of the three separate areas. Deb Thompson is handling safety violations, Don Cardinal is taking care of traffic violations, and Tom Spottedhorse and Jim Tucker are handling housing violations, "in a fair manner, according to the code book," stated Tucker.

Along with Tucker and Spottedhorse, the Residential Aids (RAs) are able to administer punishment to students on minor

violations, ranging from written warnings, to the loss of visitation. "Substance abuse and violence will not be tolerated,"

said Dr. Karen Gillis, Dean of Student Services.

"...Things are happening faster," says Gillis. Incidents are being taken care of in a more timely manner, and handled by the people in the area relevant to where the incidents might be occurring.

With this being a new system for Haskell to handle these problems, there may be flaws found. "We will have to go through at the end of the year, and review what is working and what isn't," says Gillis. Jim

Tucker also stated "This new system is working well so far, and if we can find some things that need to be worked on, we will."

## Editorial: Another Look At Where Your Fees Are Going

At the end of last fall's semester the Board of Regents voted on the fee increase proposal. The proposal was to increase fees that would be for housing, student activities, and the library.

The Board of Regents wanted the fee increase to be for the students, and not be towards anything else. Throughout the following spring semester it was being decided where the money would go based on meetings and student input.

The decision about where to distribute the fees was finally made in June 05'. The current distribution of the original \$105 students were paying before the increase would stay the same. (On-campus: \$35 housing, \$35 library, \$35 student activities / Off-campus \$35 library, \$35 student activities) The \$105 fee increase for on-campus students will be distributed with 65% (\$68.25) to food services, 20% (\$21.00) hous-

ing, and 15% (\$15.75) to student activities. Off-campus students' fee increase is \$35 to library.

The biggest chunk of the fee increase went towards food services. Around the middle of spring 2005, Curtis Hall stopped serving soda with the meals. Along with the lack of soda, many vending machines were put near the beverage dispenser in Curtis Hall.

I can assume that with food services' money flow running low that they had to cut off soda. Even at the time that the Board of Regents voted for the fee increase they were told that Curtis Hall wouldn't have enough funds to keep serving towards the end of the semester (spring 05') semester.

If the cost of food had gone up, then it should have been made relevant at the time and by how much. The allocation of the fee increase was decided based on the Student Satisfaction Survey. Some of the surveys were taken at Curtis Hall,

around the time that they stopped serving soda. Of course students are more likely to think that food services need to be improved when asked at such an opportune moment. The problem is, do better food services make us better students? I would think books would be a priority.

Another thing about the fee increase; why is it that on-campus students pay more, while off-campus students only have the \$35 fee increase? I understand why they wouldn't pay the housing increase, but what about student activities and food services? As far as I know off-campus students can eat one meal a day at Curtis on weekdays. So, wouldn't they have to pay at least a \$20 fee for food services and \$15 fee for student activities?

The overall picture that I see; why did the Board of Regents vote on a fee increase proposal if the increase ends up going wherever the administration decides?

### Aquarius (Jan. 20- Feb. 18)

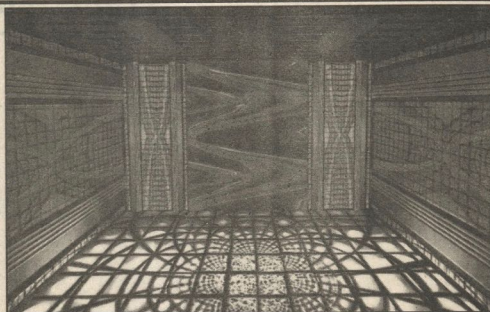

# Weather Forecast September 20-24

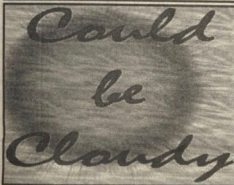

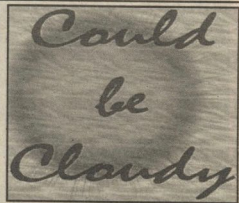
**Saturday, September 24th**

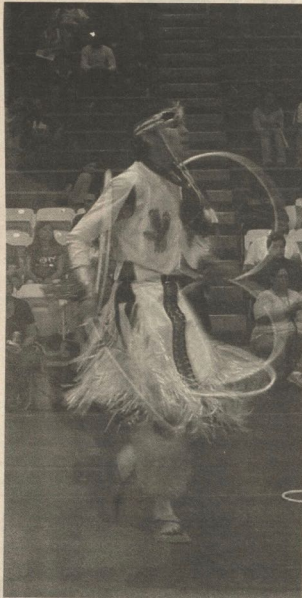
